## **RELATIONSHIPS AND SEXUAL EDUCATION (RSE) POLICY**

From September 2020, pupils receiving secondary education must be taught Relationships and Sex Education, under the Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex Education, and Health Education (England) Regulations 2019.

#### **Rationale**

We must prepare our students to take their part in the adult world in a manner, which fulfils the expectations of society and which enables them to be informed and happy individuals. Their capacity to manage themselves as adults successfully includes understanding, and constructively using, their own sexuality. It is expected that any element of sex education, which arises during the course of any lesson, will be discussed at an appropriate level and in an appropriate manner.

### **Introduction**

The objective of Relationship and Sex Education is to enable students to learn about:

- (i) families and people who care for them, including the nature of marriage and civil partnership and their importance for family life and the bringing up of children,
- (ii) forming and maintaining caring relationships,
- (iii) the characteristics of healthy and respectful relationships, including online,
- (iv) how relationships may affect physical and mental health and wellbeing, and how to ensure they are safe, and
- (v) intimate and sexual relationships, including sexual health.

Relationships and sex education will only use teaching and materials which are appropriate to the age and the religious background of the pupils receiving it.

## Parental, staff and student involvement regarding the policy

The Academy will consult with parents and staff on the formation of the policy, and any changes made to it when it is reviewed, which will be annually. All parents will be sent an overview of the curriculum and given opportunity to ask questions or engage in a discussion about the content with a member of staff.

### Parental right to withdraw children

The Relationship and Sex policy acknowledges the right of parents to withdraw their child from some, or all of the sex education provided. (except for sex education taught under the science curriculum). Parents, however, do not have the right to withdraw their child from the relationship's education.

If a Parent wishes to withdraw their child from Sex Education the following process will take place:

- The Senior Vice Principal will discuss with the parent (and, if appropriate, the child) to ensure their wishes are understood and to clarify the nature and purpose of the curriculum and the content that will be covered.
- The Senior Vice Principal will discuss with the parent the benefits of the child receiving this
  important education and any detrimental effects that withdrawal might have on the child,
  including social or emotional effects of being excluded as well as the likelihood of the child
  hearing from their peers what was covered (and having the content channelled through a child's
  voice rather than a teacher's).
- Once discussions have taken place, except in exceptional circumstances (e.g. safeguarding concerns), the Academy will respect the parents' request to withdraw the child, up to and until three terms before the child turns 16. After that point, if the child wishes to receive sex education rather than be withdrawn, the Academy will make arrangements to provide the child with sex education during one of those terms.
- For the vast majority of students with SEND, their SEND does not need to be considered in deciding whether to grant a parental request. However, there may be exceptional circumstances where the Senior Vice Principal will want to take a students' SEND into account when making this decision.

If a student is withdrawn from sex education, the Academy will ensure that the student receives appropriate purposeful education during the period of work.

### **Key Topics**

The content of the programme has been decided through consultation. RSE is delivered to year groups by a team of suitable staff. Learning also takes place in other aspects of the curriculum as per the requirements of the National Curriculum and GCSE specifications. Students are generally taught in mixed gender groups and single gender groups are used when appropriate. Contraception and Sexual Health topics are delivered by staff who have received training and deliver a core package designed by Health Professionals.

#### **The Organisation of RSE**

All staff teaching RSE receive appropriate training from a designated expert. Teaching methods used are:

- Setting ground rules.
- Distancing techniques.
- Questioning & discussion.
- Listening and talking to informed visitors.
- Use of professional groups for advice and guidance.
- Investigative work.
- Opportunities for reflection.

The religious background of all students will be taken into account when planning teaching and materials. Sensitive topics will be handled appropriately, and all relationship education teaching will meet the requirements of equality law.

All of the content will be made accessible to all students, with bespoke packages in place for students with SEND.

#### The resources used in RSE

- Resources are created by Dorset Health Professionals (Core Package) EC resources (approved by PSHE association) and United Learning (Year 7)
- Use of visitors. The Cornerstone Academy makes use of visitors sometimes to help with all aspects of education and we believe that health workers and Theatre in Education groups to name but two examples have much to offer our students in RSE. RespectEd have been working with the school for 6 years now delivering and supporting our RSE lessons.
